



WHAT IS HAPPENING?

The Asian citrus psyllid is a tiny pest that spreads a deadly disease called Huanglongbing as it feeds off of citrus tree leaves.

Huanglongbing is a deadly citrus disease which produces mottled and yellowed leaves and bitter, green, misshapen fruits. It has no cure.

Commercially grown California citrus is a \$7.12 billion-dollar industry in 2018 according to Citrus Research Board.



The California citrus industry employs 22,000 individuals.



More than 500 square miles in Southern California are currently in quarantine.



It is estimated that more than half of California residences have a citrus tree on their property.



California is now the nation's leading supplier of fresh oranges, lemons and mandarins.



Do not move citrus plant materials across quarantine areas.
